It was truly an historic day when Her Majesty The Queen and Her Royal Highness The Duchess of Sussex, on their first engagement together, visited Halton on June 14 to officially open the Mersey Gateway Bridge.

Her Majesty and Her Royal Highness arrived in the borough by Royal Train to be greeted at Runcorn Station by local children, dignitaries and members of the public who had turned out to welcome the special guests.

The Royal pair then travelled across the Mersey Gateway to the grounds of the Catalyst Science Discovery Centre, where the official opening event took place in full view of the iconic bridge. They arrived to cheering and flag-waving from hundreds of excited local primary schoolchildren.

It was the second time Her Majesty has visited Spike Island – she officially opened the island in 1977 after it was transformed from a derelict industrial site to the beauty spot it is today.

Her Majesty and Her Royal Highness appeared delighted by a performance - "Bringing Communities Together: Bridges of Halton" - by 80 local school children, directed by the locally based, Andrew Curphey Theatre Company. The moving piece told the story of the many river crossings that have connected Runcorn and Widnes through the ages.

Leader of Halton Borough Council, Cllr Rob Polhill, gave a short speech before inviting Her Majesty to unveil a plaque. Talking about the day, he said, "It was such a proud moment to see Her Majesty officially open the Mersey Gateway Bridge and a real celebration of what can be achieved with hard work and determination. To be able to share the

day so many of our young people for whom the bridge will bring new opportunities and greater prosperity over the years and decades to come, made it extra special.



"I'd like to thank every single person who got us to this point, on what has been a long, and sometimes challenging, journey. What an unforgettable day for Halton!"

This plaque will be replicated and incorporated in two community benches which will be erected at Spike Island and Wigg Island.

More than 300 guests attended the event, many of whom helped to make the bridge a reality. A selection of guests from the development and construction of the new bridge were on hand to greet Her Majesty and Her Royal Highness along

Cllr Wall says: "I am delighted that people have got involved with this project. It has been hard work to get to this stage and a steep learning curve in parts.

"I believe that community urban green space and the opportunity for people to be able to grow their own is vitally important. I am very grateful to all the people that have assisted and the generosity that Widnes people have shown in things like donating plants.

"The first WGT site is nearing completion and has already won two awards, coming first in a regional Tesco Bags of Help funding award, following a public vote, and winning a Royal Horticultural Society award for community green space."

Cllr Wall continues: "I am proud of us winning those awards - however, I am most proud of the diverse mix of people using the site. We have individuals who otherwise would not have use of a garden, along with the Girl Guides, the Men's Shed project, the Brooker Centre and the Widnes Wonders WI.

"Gardening and access to green space is proven to be good for our health and wellbeing and group site gardening is a great way for people to interact with others and perhaps make new friends. Of course, they also get to eat their own delicious own-grown produce."

There are plans for further Widnes Growing Together allotment and community growing spaces, with the Hanley Close site being the prototype and the first growing spot of its kind in Widnes. Stepping up to help children with cerebral palsy

Kind-hearted Widnes Market traders have named their nominated charities for the coming year.

We hope you will support all they do to raise money for Stick 'n Step www.sticknstep.org and Guide Dogs for the Blind www.guidedogs.org.uk Money will be raised through various activities including the ever-popular Christmas Grotto.

Patrick Higgins, one of the Market traders, recently visited Stick 'n' Step in their premises in York Street, Runcorn, to see the work they do. This was one of

the visits which helped make the decision to support this well-loved local charity. Stick 'n' Step provides free of charge conductive education sessions to local children with cerebral palsy, allowing them to gain the skills they need to live independent lives. Cerebral palsy is a condition that affects muscle control and movement. Conductive education sessions incorporate play and music into structured routines to develop



functional skills, improve the children's mobility and independence and boost self-confidence. Every child works towards their own set of personalised goals which are all designed to translate into movements, techniques and strategies that will help in real life. From moving around independently, to improving self-feeding; and learning to use the toilet on their own to tying shoelaces, everything in the sessions is designed to reduce each child's dependency on other people, and to give them the best chances of living a full and independent life. The Runcorn centre which opened last year is a large, bright space with specialist equipment, a sensory room, fully accessible children's toilets, a bathroom, parents' room, kitchen and office. Patrick Higgins says: "Widnes Market is at the heart of the local community and is very important to residents, while Stick 'n' Step's work transforms the lives of local children and their families, so it seemed to me to be an ideal choice for the market's Charity of the Year. I am so pleased that Stick 'n' Step was selected."

Football legend & Runcorn war hero is honoured

Halton Borough Council is marking the history of Runcorn FC by naming a new road into Millbank Linnets Stadium development after one of the club's legends, Jack Search.

The stadium in Murdishaw opened its doors to a new era in the club's history in 2010. Since then improvements to the facilities and a new club house have been added as part of a wider development of the site. Supermarket Aldi is set to open there alongside a family pub and retail units.

This development, coupled with Runcorn's successful 2017/18 campaign, which saw them promoted into the EVO-STIK League Division One West as champions, proves that the future is bright for the Trust-run club which only reformed in 2006. Jack Search was a towering and imposing centre forward for Runcorn FC in the 1930's and a prolific goal scorer. He reputedly turned down a chance to play professionally for Arsenal during his time at Runcorn preferring instead to remain as an amateur with the town club.

In 1939 he took part in a now legendary game in the club's history where Runcorn, in front of a 10,000 strong crowd, took on the cup holders Preston North End in the FA cup. In the Preston team that day was Bill Shankly.

Unfortunately the Second World War interrupted Jack's playing career at the height of his powers

sending him off to serve as a Lieutenant in North Africa, rising to the rank of Lieutenant Colonel. He was later awarded the George Cross for his conspicuous gallantry in Italy, one of the highest awards in the military field. After the war he returned to Runcorn and

Playing as an amateur Jack earned his wage as a salesman for the Liverpool United Gas Company, according to the Runcorn Linnets official web site biography.

However, once his playing career was over Jack became one of five Directors of Everton Football Club during Howards Kendall's first and most productive managerial spell at the club.

During this time Jack oversaw both league and cup successes. His longtime friendship with Bill Shankly continued throughout their lives. Halton Borough Council's Executive Board Member for Sport, Cllr Phil Harris, said: "We thought we needed to mark this legend of the local game. The development is set to be opened later this year and hopefully Jack can bring the Linnets further success in the future."



National Lottery support for Halton's gallant heroes

Halton Heritage Partnership has received a National Lottery grant for a project to mark the First World War centenary.

'Halton's Gallant Heroes', a project covering Widnes, Runcorn, Daresbury and Moore, has received £9,900 through the Heritage Lottery Fund's First World War: Then and Now programme.

Those who died during WWI are commemorated on the borough's cenotaphs and our VC recipients have been recognised, but the many other gallantry awards for those who survived WWI have not.

The project will help to build awareness among the general community and within local schools of heroism and, crucially, the life stories of those who survived the war and what their life was like post-war.

It will enable local people in Halton to come together to preserve memories. Volunteers will collect photographs, newspaper clippings, documents, letters and photos of keepsakes, as well as family tales passed down to help them build a clear picture of what life was really like.

The information gathered will be digitally recorded and uploaded to Halton's Virtual Museum website www.haltonheritage.co.uk where everyone can access and contribute information. The archive will allow the public to discuss, contribute, share and research information about the Home Front.

The project will initially deliver up to 20 short biographies of WWI heroes who survived the War and who are no longer with us to be able to tell their own compelling stories so those of us in the 21st century do not forget their bravery. Chairman of Halton Heritage Partnership, Frank Lawless, said: "We're delighted that we've received this support thanks to National Lottery players, especially those in Halton. It will enable local heritage to be recorded for future generations, especially those who gained gallantry awards, survived and led a life post-war."

Halton Heritage Partnership is a voluntary/public group of societies and organisations who promote heritage in the borough and bring it to life.

Everyone's been enjoying the sunny spring weather and hopefully, it's set to continue into summer. But whether you are holidaying here at home in the UK or abroad, be sun safe and follow our top tips for protecting your skin from the sun.

1. Use shade and stay out of the sun between 11am and 3pm

2. Know the shadow rule – if your shadow is shorter than you are tall, the sun can burn you.

3. Cover up

4. Drink plenty of water

5. Protect your shoulders and neck – remember to use sun cream on your head if you have thin or no hair

6. Wear good quality sunglasses that have a CE mark and British Standard, a UV 400 label or offer 100% UV protection.

7. Wear a hat - the wider the brim, the better the protection

8. Use sun cream - at least factor 15 with at least four-star UVA. Be sure to use plenty. For adults that's at least 2 teaspoons of sun cream to cover your head, arms and neck. For your whole body - use at least 6 teaspoons. Don't forget your shoulders, nose, ears, cheeks and tops of feet.

9. Sun cream will wash off when swimming - even waterproof ones.

10. Remember - you can burn in the UK. Take extra care and use sunscreen at home as well as abroad, even on cloudy days.

How a minor injury lead to a skin cancer diagnosis



Ian was diagnosed with malignant melanoma six years ago. What seemed like a minor bump to his hand at work developed into something more serious. As a plasterer for Halton Housing, Ian was used to getting knocks to his hands, so didn't think anything of it at first. However, it wouldn't heal so growing concerned, Ian went to see his GP. Tests showed that the injury to his nail was actually malignant melanoma – skin cancer.

lan was devastated and feared the worst. His thumb was amputated and lymph nodes from under his arm were removed. Thankfully, lan's treatment was successful and he has been clear for 6 years. But his message is clear – if you have any unexplained marks, injuries or moles anywhere on your body, be safe and get checked.

"I was worried about taking time off and losing money at work. But in the end life is more important than bricks and mortar.

"If you notice any lumps, bumps, moles or freckles that look different or unusual, don't think that you're a hard case or that it will never happen to you. Don't worry about the time off work, get yourself checked because skin cancer does happen and can kill you. Getting checked can save your life!"

'Catch' our new app for parents in Halton!

The early years of your child's life can be some of the most rewarding, but also the most challenging, especially when it comes to your child's health.

Where can you find reliable information about common illnesses, immunisations, milestones, etc.?

CATCH is a free new app for parents and carers in Halton with children aged 0 to 5 years and pulls information from reliable sources including the NHS straight to your phone or tablet.

As well as information about common health problems and treatments, you can also receive alerts reminding you when immunisations are due as well as seasonal advice, such as how to protect your child

and family from flu. You can also access information about symptoms, self-care and treatment which can help you to decide if you really need to see a doctor. As your child grows, the information you receive from Catch is tailored to match your and your child's needs. Find out more at

The app is available now to download from the App Store or Google Play and once installed on your phone or tablet, you simply enter the first part of your postcode (e.g. WA7) and some basic details about your children (their date of birth, first name, gender) to have instant access to a wealth of information.

Do you know the symptoms of Sepsis?

Sepsis is a potentially life-threatening condition, but it can be easily treated if caught early enough. Symptoms of sepsis will present differently between adults and children.

Sepsis could occur as the result of any infection and there is no one sign for sepsis. It can initially look like flu, gastroenteritis or a chest infection. For adults, get medical help urgently if you develop any of the following:

- Slurred speech or confusion
- Extreme shivering or muscle pain
- Passing no urine (in a day)
- Severe breathlessness
- It feels like you're going to die
- Skin mottled or discoloured.

If your child is unwell with either a fever or very low temperature (or has had a fever in the last 24 hours), and has any of these symptoms, go to A&E immediately or call 999:

- Is breathing very fast
- Has a 'fit' or convulsion
- Looks mottled, bluish, or pale
- Has a rash that does not fade when you press it
- Is very lethargic or difficult to wake
- Feels abnormally cold to touch.

Make sure you don't miss out on discounted bridge crossings

We hope you have been enjoying quicker, easier and more reliable journeys across the Mersey Gateway Bridge.

This October will mark a year since the Mersey Gateway Bridge opened to traffic.

If you registered for the Local User Discount Scheme prior to the bridge opening on 14 October 2017, it's now time to renew to make sure you can enjoy these benefits for another 12 months.

If you registered after the bridge opened you don't have to do anything now.

It's easy to renew and there are a few ways to do it, but renewing at www.merseyflow.co.uk is the quickest.

If you qualify for discounted trips, here's what you need to do to renew online:

- Scan or take photographs of your three identification documents - your driving licence, a 2018/2019 council tax bill and your V5C vehicle registration document
- Go online at merseyflow.co.uk and login to your account. It's straightforward, but if you have forgotten your password there's an easy way to reset. Just click 'forgot password' and follow the instructions on screen.

- 3. Once you're logged in you need to click the 'Renew my Plan' link, which is next to the red triangle at the top of your account screen.
- 4. You'll then need to pay your £10 annual renewal fee.
- Next, you need to upload copies or photos of your three identification documents - your driving licence, a 2018/2019 council tax bill and your V5C vehicle registration document. We need all three in order to renew your account.
- We'll email your confirmation that's it! Once approved you will be able to enjoy another 12 months of journeys at no further cost.

If you registered before the bridge opened, your current plan will expire on 13 October 2018. Your new 12-month plan will apply from 14 October 2018.

You don't need a new sticker so please keep your current merseyflow sticker in your car windscreen.

The walk-in centre is open from 9am to 7pm Monday to Friday and 9am to 6pm Saturday, Sunday and bank holidays.

If you are a Halton resident who is not eligible for the Local User Discount you may qualify for help through the Local User Discount Support Scheme.

Your views wanted on dog control orders

Halton Borough Council is consulting on proposals to create a new Public Spaces Protection Order (PSPO) to help increase its powers to promote responsible dog ownership.

Local authorities have the power to create a PSPO where activities are taking place that can have a detrimental effect on the local community's quality of life.

Dog fouling and other forms of anti-social behaviour associated with irresponsible dog ownership are significant issues for many local people in Halton.

The Council recognises that the vast majority of dog owners are responsible, pick up after their dogs and keep them under proper control. However, there is a minority of people who do not.

As well as seeking views on its proposals to continue with some existing powers and increase the number of locations where current control measures will apply, the Council is consulting on proposals to introduce a number of new powers. The controls that are being proposed as part of the new PSPO include;

- Dogs being excluded from defined areas of the borough
- Dogs being required to be kept on a lead in defined areas of the borough
- Dog walkers being required to carry bags to clean up after their dog has fouled
- A restriction on the number of dogs that an individual can walk at any one time.

Breach of a PSPO is a criminal offence and individuals who do so face being issued with a Fixed Penalty Notice of £100. While the new PSPO would provide enhanced enforcement powers, the primary aim is to deter irresponsible behaviour by dog owners and reduce the need for enforcement measures.

The Council is inviting you to share your views on these proposals by completing a survey online at **www.halton.gov.uk/dogcontrol** or paper copies are available at Direct Link shops.

The consultation end on 28 September. The outcome will be considered by the Executive Board in the Autumn.

Police Community Bases to open across Halton

Community buildings across Halton are set to be declared police community bases to allow PCSOs to spend more time in the heart of the communities they serve.

Housed in existing buildings, the bases will provide a facility for PCSOs to hold regular surgeries or have confidential discussions with victims, witnesses and other members of the public.

In some areas, PCSOs will be able to begin and end their daily shift at their community base to increase the amount of time they have to meet local residents and deal with local issues.

Runcom Library, the Catalyst Museum and Halton Brook Children's Centre are among the venues identified as suitable community venues for PCSOs to work from in Halton.

In total, Runcorn and Widnes will have 17 police community bases, with 122 being rolled-out across the whole of Cheshire to bring policing closer to communities.

Each of the 17 communities identified across Halton will also have its own dedicated PCSO that local residents will be able to easily recognise and work with on issues of concern to them.

Police & Crime Commissioner for Cheshire, David Keane, said: "I am proud that we've been able to introduce a police base and PCSO for every community across Cheshire to help re-establish community policing across the county.

"When I was elected I promised the Cheshire residents more feet on the beat' and this model is helping us put community officers back where they belong.

"Under the previous model, some PCSOs were travelling miles each day to the community they were based in, wasting valuable time that they could be spending in their communities.

"The new bases will help increase police interaction with individual communities, providing a named, recognisable officer and an easily accessible police base for local residents in shared community buildings at no extra cost to the taxpayer."

The new bases are currently being rolled-out and are all set to be in operation by the end of July 2018.

School wages War on plastic

A Halton primary school is taking steps to look after their world and drastically reduce consumption of single-use plastic.

Lunt's Heath Primary School Council realised plastic pollution is damaging our oceans and hurting the environment, as it is not naturally bio-degradable material.

Staff at the Widnes school are now empowering the children to act on their beliefs and spread the word. The pupils' Single Use of Plastic campaign was based on the evidence from Gary and Sam Bencheghib who paddled through pollution along the Citarum River, one of the world's most polluted rivers, on a kayak made from plastic waste.

They created a film from their expedition and got the attention of the Ministry of the Environment of Indonesia. A short time after their film was shared on social media the Government announced a two year plan to clean up the river.

After sharing the video with the School Council, pupils decided on a self -driven project to inform and educate the schoolchildren and local community of the damage disposable plastic is causing.

The project was recently launched in the school by Halton Borough Council's Mayor and Mayoress, Cllrs John and Marjorie Bradshaw.

Head Andrew Williams said: "During a meeting to launch a pledge to change the way in which people think about using single-use plastic at school, the School Council has shared their passion to schools across Halton, inviting them to join in with this pledge.

"Children have also joined up with another local primary school, Farnworth C of E, to encourage them to act with us on this important issue."

Halton Borough Council's Executive Board Member for Children, Young People and Families, Cllr Tom McInerney, said: "It's great that young people care so much about the environment. Let's hope others follow their lead."

Lunt's Heath pupils pledged to take action together by:

Informing and educating our school and local community of the damage disposable plastic is causing, encouraging our family and friends to make lifestyle changes that reduce their consumption of single use plastic.



- Auditing the use of single-use plastic in school, reducing its consumption by 50% in Year 1 with a view to removing it entirely by the end of Year 2.
- Undertaking a full audit of the school's plastic consumption with a view to making sustainable replacements where possible.
- Promising to share plastic pollution solutions with our community.

UN FACELIFT Park playground gets a

The children's play area at Phoenix Park, Runcorn, is getting an upgrade this summer.

Halton Council's revamp of the 12-year-old playground will include more accessible equipment for children of all ages and abilities. New kit includes a multi-activity play unit with ramped access, swings with a variety of seats, a flush-floor roundabout, a see-saw with extra-



supportive seats, a ground-level trampoline and a sensory interactive play train.

Funding for the £111,000 project will come from a variety of sources, including WREN's FCC Community Action Fund which provides grants to community projects using money generated from the landfill community funds of FCC Environment Ltd.

Halton Borough Council is providing funds via the local Area Forum and from Open Space Services' capital playground improvement budget.

Additional funds have been provided by Windmill Hill Big Local and Tesco, through its 'Bags of Help' scheme.

The Council's Executive Board Member for the Physical Environment, Cllr Ron Hignett, said: "This will improve the facilities in what is one of the area's most popular parks. I am sure everyone will welcome the work we are doing there.
