The curtain will soon come down on Halton Borough of Culture 2021 at the end of a fantastic year filled with street art, outdoor theatre, exhibitions, nature trails, arts and crafts festivals and a music weekender.

Despite the unwelcome restrictions of the pandemic, the year began with the appearance of colourful murals by local artist Calum Medforth at Ditton and Runcorn Libraries to re-inspire the community after Covid and bring some unity, hope and joy to the community, through bold colours and the use of positive, natural and local imagery.

Culture HQ in Runcorn Shopping City launched in the Spring as a hub for all things Borough of Culture, providing opportunities to connect to the creative community of Halton and has offered the chance for Halton artists to share their own work as well as providing a programme of

interesting and diverse workshops and events.

Halton Libraries launched the first festival of the year in with Let's Make! featuring a range of activities including puppet making, pixel art, tote bag design, printing workshops, book sculpture and an online talk with the best-selling author S.E. Lynes, with many of the workshops sold out.

street theatre across the borough, and several Halton venues held their own events such as outdoor theatre at Norton Priory Museum & Gardens, the Craftastic Fayre at the Barnyards, Widnes, and summer holiday children's activities at community centres.

Music featured heavily in the Celebrate Halton calendar, beginning with the Get It Loud in Libraries concerts, local artist gigs at the Brindley Theatre and culminated in the Celebrate Halton Music Weekender which lit up the borough with a cacophony of sounds in small venues and unusual spaces, showcasing local and national artists and musical genres from traditional to hip-hop and electro sounds.

The Liberty UK Festival, a multi-artform popup festival celebrating freedom and democracy and the Where There is Light installation at Catalyst Museum, a digital light installation showcasing the stories of refugees and asylum seekers ushered in the autumn programme. This was followed by the fascinating Museum of the Moon Installation at Norton Priory Museum & Gardens. The installation is a fusion of lunar imagery, moonlight and surround sound composition created by BAFTA and Ivor Novello award winning composer Dan Jones. Norton Priory scheduled a number of moon inspired events such as music, meditation and children's stories


to celebrate the event.

Halton's adult learners have returned to the classroom for the autumn term and are enjoying some great new facilities and equipment at Kingsway Learning Centre.


Halton Borough Council was awarded £700,000 of funding from the Liverpool **City Region Combined Authority which has** been spent on a refurbishment of the Centre and classroom equipment to prepare for the 2020 Digital Skills programmes.

The Combined Authority had launched an £18m fund to enable local colleges and learning providers to improve their facilities.

The refurbishment at Kingsway included the creation of a dedicated Adult Learning Reception, which provides a warm welcome for learners and visitors, plus a new lift.

In response to feedback from learners a spacious and comfortable breakout area has been created where learners can relax in between classes or have lunch, and the management and staff office has been reconfigured to make better use of the

some of the rooms allowing for capacity flexibility, and everywhere has been brightened up with a fresh coat of paint, improved lighting, replacement flooring and new furniture.

New equipment includes Clevertouch screens, display cabinets and digital information screens, while investment in new technology has provided classroom equipment including laptops, Ipads and coding and virtual reality kits.

Siobhan Saunders, the Council's Divisional Manager for Employment, Learning and Skills, said the staff and learners are delighted with the long-overdue improvements: "It's made such a difference. We couldn't have done it without the investment from the Liverpool City Region Combined Authority.

"We also received a £40k Access Grant from the Combined Authority to encourage learners back to the centre following the pandemic. So we've produced a Welcome to Adult Learning video, and put together learner packs for each student at the start of term., which have gone down really well.

"Also, we commissioned a short video on the Prevent agenda which is shown to all of our learners as part of their induction. It's an excellent way of getting the messages to learners about online safety, radicalisation and the Prevent agenda.


Halton residents have been keen to resume learning, with enrolment in courses for the autumn looking healthy, with the most popular courses include IT, employability, childcare and art.

Norton Priory unearths more

Students and Halton residents have been digging for treasure at Norton Priory Museum & Gardens!



The Priory has teamed up with Liverpool University on a series of excavations to uncover the site's archaeological secrets. Students from the Archaeology, Classics and Egyptology department have been working on the extensive medieval moat system and the Canons' burial ground.

Around 80 undergraduates, directed by Professor Harold Mytum and

Dr Rob Philpott, learned an array of archaeological techniques while uncovering more of the Runcorn site's past. This was followed by a community dig where local residents came along to take part in the excavations alongside the experts.

The results of the excavations - and some of the star finds - will be displayed in the museum in due course.

Norton Priory is recognised as being Europe's largest excavated monastic site.

Dating back to 1134, the site achieved abbey status in 1391 before the arrival of King Henry VIII's men in 1536 brought about its dissolution. Between 1545 and 1921 the site was home to the Brooke family, with a Tudor house and a later Georgian mansion both utilising the Undercroft of the monastic complex as part of the living accommodation.

Norton Priory is also well known for the community excavations which ran from 1971 to 1987. Although these were extensive, and visitors to the site today can enjoy seeing the ruins that were unearthed, there remains much to discover.

To celebrate 50 years since the first community dig, Norton Priory welcomed back the first excavation director, Dr Patrick Greene OBE, who visited the dig and held a sell-out talk.

Also visiting the excavations and taking a tour of the museum with Senior Keeper, Lynn Smith, were Shadow Culture Minister Alison McGovern MP, Halton MP Derek Twigg, Weaver Vale MP Mike Amesbury, Cllr Paul Nolan, Halton Council's portfolio holder for Culture and Leisure, and Halton's Mayor and Mayoress, Cllr Christopher Rowe and Mrs Joanne Rowe.



hidden treasures

Cllr Nolan has a particular interest in Norton Priory and its excavations, having studied Archaeology at university. He said: "When I heard that there was to be an archaeological dig at Norton Priory, I really couldn't wait to go and have a look! What a fantastic treasure we have in our borough - Western Europe's largest excavated medieval monastic site, which continues to reveal its past with exciting finds. I'm sure there are many more secrets yet to be revealed in future digs."

• Norton Priory has received £43,500 from the Art Fund Reimagine grants for its 'Mindful Museum' programme of activity. Once a centre for medieval contemplation and spirituality, the funding will support Norton Priory to revisit the site's Augustinian roots, providing a 21st century place for wellbeing and mindfulness. Using the archaeological site and collection as inspiration and its modern, purpose-built facilities, Norton Priory will provide restful, imaginative and mindful activity to all.

Beautiful 17th Century cabinet returns to Norton Priory

An important piece of grand 17th Century furniture from the Brooke family house is being restored for display at the museum, 100 years after it left the site.

The Brooke family has a long association with Norton Priory, from the purchase of the site in 1545 through to 1966 when the Priory was given in trust for the benefit of the public by Sir Richard Brooke. However, it was in 1921 that the family left the house.

The museum only has a few items that tell the story of the Brookes' time at Norton Priory, and even fewer which speak of the luxury and grandeur of the Georgian house. However, the Museum secured funding from the Art Fund Acquisition Find and Arts Council England / V&A Purchase grants towards the purchase, at auction, of two important items from the house. They were also generously supported in the process by the experience and knowledge of Tomasso, respected art professionals based in Leeds and London.

These two important pieces are a 17th Century Antwerp collector's cabinet, later married to a fine







A Museum spokesperson says: "We are delighted that we have been able, with the support of the funders, to secure this cabinet for display. It demonstrates perfectly the quality that was embodied by the house which was once on the site. We know the cabinet was in an ante-room to the library, and it is believed to have left Norton Priory in 1921. We are thrilled that 100 years later, it is now returning where it will form part of our permanent collection

"The cabinet is currently being restored at a specialist studio, and will be returning to Norton Priory once the work is completed. We are preparing for its display early next year."

Could you welcome a person with a care or support need in to your own home? This may suit you if you are looking for a rewarding challenge and you wish to work from home with a payment of between £200-£600 per week. (Depending on the level of care provided).

There are lots of ways you can get involved with Shared Lives. You can offer:

- A LONG-TERM PLACEMENT
- A SHORT-BREAK PLACEMENT
- DAY CARE PLACEMENTS.

You need to live within the Halton boundary to provide this type of support. You will receive full training for your role and support from a team of Shared Lives Workers. Shared Lives can offer you a great opportunity if you're looking for a career change, a new challenge or maybe approaching retirement.

The scheme will match you with someone who they feel you could support, who may have similar interests, likes and preferences to yourself. Experience of providing care would be desired but it is not essential. All applicants will undertake an assessment which will include character employer and GP references, a Disclosure and Barring Service check, and a health and safety check on your property. Your assessment will be approved by an independent panel.

Staying warm and well

Feeling warm and cosy at home feels good, but it's also important for our health. Being cold makes it harder for our body to fight off viruses and infections and breathing in cold area can increase the risk of chest infections, putting people with long term health conditions, older people, babies and young children at risk.

If you find you are switching off your heating to save money, or you are struggling with fuel debt, or an unreliable heating system and a cold home – there is help out there for you.

The Save Energy Advice Line, run by Energy Projects Plus (EPP), can help you apply for a Warm Home Discount, switching energy tariff, broken heating systems and fuel debt and advise on free replacement boilers, replacement white goods and simple energy saving measures.

There are others ways to help stay warm,

- Having hot food and drinks
- Wearing lots of thin layers (clothes made from cotton, wool or fleecy fibres are best).
- Heat the rooms you use eg the living room during the day and your bedroom just before you go to bed.
- Keep your home heated to the right temperature: 210C is an ideal temperature to keep you warm and healthy. 180C is the minimum night-time bedroom temperature for adults and older children (160C - 200C for a baby's room) you might feel cold but there should be no risk to your health.





Put a HaltOn Loneliness this winter

Loneliness can increase during the winter months, especially for older people who may find it harder to get out and about. Many older people can go for days on end without seeing or talking to anyone.

Halton Community Pharmacy

Pharmacists are experts in medicines who can help you with minor health concerns. They can offer clinical advice on prescriptions and over-the-counter medicines and can treat a range of minor illnesses, such as coughs, colds, sore throats, tummy trouble and aches and pains to help you recover at home.

You can walk into any community pharmacy and ask to speak with the pharmacist privately and in confidence even about the most personal symptoms. Pharmacies have private consultation rooms, and you don't need to make an appointment.

The pharmacist and their team can provide advice on which medicines to use and how to use them safely as well as dispose of any of your unneeded medicines.

Care at the chemist

If you're registered with a Halton GP, you can access the NHS Halton CCG Minor Ailments scheme CARE AT THE CHEMIST. It's free if you don't pay for prescriptions and you can get advice and treatment on a range of conditions direct from your pharmacist rather than going to your GP. Why not ask your pharmacist next time you call in?

If symptoms suggest it's something more serious, our pharmacists have the right training to make sure you get the help you need. For example they will tell you if you need to access our Urgent Treatment Centre, see a nurse, other Healthcare Professional or another local service.



NHS 111



If you're feeling poorly but aren't sure if it's an emergency contact NHS 111 or log on to 111nhs.uk

NHS 111 both online and via the telephone, makes it easy for you to access healthcare advice when you need medical help fast, but it's not a life-threatening

NHS 111 is a free number, which is available 24-hours a day, seven days a week. The call handlers can provide health advice, put you in touch with the right service, arrange to have you seen by a doctor or call you an ambulance.

You can also go to NHS 111 online using your smartphone or laptop. You'll answer questions about your symptoms and receive tailored advice on what to do next and where to go.

Make the right Choices



An A&E department (also known as emergency department or casualty) should only be used for genuine life-threatening emergencies, such as loss of consciousness, chest pain, breathing difficulties, severe bleeding that cannot be stopped, stroke or major trauma such as a road traffic accident. Less severe injuries can be treated in urgent treatment centres or minor injuries units.



Halton's Urgent Treatment Centres are here to help you stay well this winter

NHS Urgent Treatment Centres in Runcorn and Widnes are open 8am to 9pm, seven days a week, 365 days a year (including bank holidays) but please arrive before 8pm to allow time to be seen before closing.

Please choose your NHS wisely this winter. Our Urgent Treatment Centres have an x-ray department, and you can be seen here for a wide range of issues that require urgent treatment, but are not life-threatening, such as:

- Minor cuts or wounds Bites, stings, rashes and allergic reactions Minor burns and scalds
 - · Sprains, strains and joint pains · Ear or eye injuries and infections

The centres also provide arrival time slots for patients who contact NHS 111. If you're experiencing a 999 emergency, which means that it is critical or life-threatening, then phone 999 for emergency help.

Your medicine cabinet



Be prepared for common minor health problems by keeping a well-stocked medicine cabinet at home. The list below is recommended by The Royal Pharmaceutical Society and will help you deal with most minor ailments.

- · Pain relief
- Antihistamines
- · Oral rehydration salts
- Anti-diarrhoea tablets
- Indigestion treatment
- · A first aid kit Top

Medicine safety

Ask your local pharmacist for help and advice, especially if you take regular medication

- Medicines should be kept out of sight and reach of children
- Regularly check expiry dates
- Always follow the directions on the pack and never take more than stated.



Let's keep being kind

Across the country, GP practices are seeing a rise in demand which is significantly higher than you would normally see at this time of year.

Staff are working extremely hard to keep patients safe and ensure they receive the care they need and we're asking for patience and support from patients and the public.

As well as delivering essential services, practice staff have made invaluable contributions to the COVID-19 vaccination programme, helping to vaccinate over 86% of Halton residents and rolling out the booster vaccine, ensuring our most vulnerable patients are protected.

Most people that enter surgeries are poorly, which means precautions like still adhering to social distancing and wearing masks and protective clothing to keep people safe are still in place.

Surgeries in Halton are open, but most appointments are being clinically triaged, which means they're being assessed by one of the GPs or a senior practice nurse to decide which member of the clinical team you should be seeing.

The level of demand means it can, at times, take longer for you to get through to your GP practice on the phone. If it's not urgent, some practices have the facility to complete an online form which will be sent to your practice and the appropriate person will get back to you.

All the practices in Halton have teams of specialists who work alongside the doctors such as advanced nurse practitioners, practice nurses, mental health workers, clinical pharmacists and physiotherapists. They can all diagnose and treat health conditions.

Please remember that staff behind the NHS uniform are people, too. Please be kind and understanding – they're doing everything they can to make sure patients are kept safe and receive the right care when it's needed.

Wash those 'winter nasties' away

Washing your hands with soap and water is one of the easiest ways to protect yourself and others from illnesses such as food poisoning, diarrhoea, flu and COVID-19.

COVID-19.

Wash your hands thoroughly for the amount of time it takes to sing "Happy Birthday" twice (around 20 seconds).

You should wash your hands:

- · once you get home, or into work
- · after using the toilet or changing a nappy
- before and after handling raw foods like meat and vege tables
- before eating or handling food
- · after blowing your nose, sneezing or coughing
- · before and after treating a cut or wound
- after touching animals, including pets, their food and after cleaning their cages

Washing your hands properly removes dirt, viruses and bacteria to stop them spreading to other people and objects. If you don't have immediate access to soap and water then use alcohol-based handrub.

"I was given a warm welcome from the Shopping City team, other retailers and local customers and am grateful for the opportunity of funding support for the first six months while the business becomes established."



Four years of quicker, easier, more reliable journeys

In total, Halton residents, businesses and commuters have made 86.3 million journeys over the River Mersey in Halton since the Mersey Gateway Bridge opened at midnight on 14 October 2017.

Tolling provider merseyflow is expecting to see two million vehicles making crossings each month across the Mersey Gateway and Silver Jubilee bridges this autumn/winter.

The most recent figures released by merseyflow show that an average of just 9,000 vehicles a

day now use the Silver Jubilee Bridge – far less than the 80,000 vehicles a day it used to carry. **Latest bridge figures:**

- Traffic levels in summer were back to 95% of pre-pandemic volumes this was the busiest quarter since 2019 and the autumn/winter is expected to see two million vehicles a month using the bridges
- Over 97% of journeys were paid for on time
- the vast majority of people are paying for their journeys by midnight the day after they cross

- Over 90% of payments are made through digital or automated channels –






